Course Description

This course will examine the changing role of the mass media and the role that the mass media plays in our democratic system. The course will put particular emphasis on providing students with firsthand opportunities to learn about how reporters and editors select and approach political stories and how political actors work with the media to communicate to the public. Particular attention will be paid to debates about the freedom and independence of the press in the modern era and the role that public opinion should play in public policy making.

Political Science Learning Objectives

In this course, students will be required to:

- Explain the structure, goals, and purpose of various forms of mass media in the United States, how these structures have changed over time, and how the media interacts with the public, elected officials and other political actors.
- Identify, explain, analyze and critique key theories in media and politics, including:
- Relate theoretical knowledge to empirical observations of media coverage of contemporary political events.
- Engage in detailed reading and analysis of primary texts, journal articles, and/or scholarly books on subjects related to mass media and American politics.

Required Books

Doris A. Graber and Johanna L. Dunaway, [Mass Media and American Politics](#), Congressional Quarterly Press, Washington DC. Ninth Edition, 2014.

Check the bookstore to see if they have copies of the book, but do not order a hard copy of the book. If you find a hard copy at the bookstore and wish to purchase it, that's fine. If you order one, it is unlikely to come in time to do you any good. Just download either the Kindle or Vital Source versions of the book. The Kindle version of the book is \$46 on Amazon. Alternatively, you can purchase 180 days of access to an online version of the book at Vital Source for slightly cheaper (\$36). Go to www.vitalsource.com and create an account if you want to do it that way.

ASSIGNMENTS

MEDIA AND DEMOCRACY ASSIGNMENT #1 (DUE FIRST WEDNESDAY):

Use the readings from Monday's class to assess whether the arguments put forward by [Tocqueville](#) support [Davis' position](#) or [Shafer's position](#) on the importance of newspapers to democracy. No more than four pages, double spaced, please. Include a works cited page (doesn't count for page number).

NEWSMAKER ASSIGNMENT #2 (DUE FIRST THURSDAY): Bring in 3 recent press releases from local politicians. In no more than four double spaced pages, consider whether you would consider each of the three press releases newsworthy for a daily newspaper, a local television news program, and a radio talk show. On what basis did you make your determination? How did your perspective of what is newsworthy change depending on the medium?

5 -PAGE PAPER (DUE SECOND MONDAY): Answer the following question in no fewer than 5 double-spaced pages: *Is journalism essential to democracy? If so, what kind of journalism do we need for our democracy to function well? Is our current media system up to the task? If not, what if anything should be done?* Though this question should incorporate some of the course readings, a strong answer will also include additional independent research on this topic. Consider a visit to the [Columbia Journalism Review](#), as well as right leaning media criticism sites such as [Media Research Center](#), and left-leaning media criticism sites such as [Media Matters](#). The Pew Studies linked at the bottom of this page may also be helpful. As a general rule of thumb, a 5-page paper should have no fewer than 5 outside sources. Personally, when I see 7 or 8 sources for a paper of this size, I think that's pretty good. Please don't use Wikipedia as a source. Format requirements: double spaced, 12-point font, one-inch margins. Include a title and a works cited page (this doesn't count toward the 5-pages).

PRESS RELEASE ASSIGNMENT #3 (DUE SECOND TUESDAY): Write a press release from the perspective of one of the Hamilton County Commissioners on one of the issues that is scheduled to be debated at Wednesday's commission meeting. You can find the agenda for Wednesday's meeting [here](#). For basic info on press releases, take a look through the first part of the powerpoint presentation that we went over in class. More importantly, read through John Czwartacki's guide on how to write a press release (we read it last week). You can select any issue on the agenda for the meeting. We will discuss this more in class.

STORY ASSIGNMENT #4 (DUE SECOND WEDNESDAY by 10 PM): Write a 750 to 1,000 word news story on the Hamilton County Commissioner's Meeting. Refer back to Prof. Weiser's class discussion and Bill Parks basic newswriting reading (see syllabus) for help in crafting the story. Story should include a headline and a nutgraph
