THE UNDERGRADUATE SUMMER—

The University's Summer Sessions will provide some excellent course selections for the undergraduate student. Xavier offers a full summer program of classes during two sessions for the college undergraduate—both Xavier matriculated students and the summer visiting student. Courses are available both during the daytime and evenings.

The schedule of courses include curricula for enrichment, for acceleration, for summer progress of continuing education students, and for the student who might wish to make up some deficiency. There are substantial offerings in business, in the arts and humanities, and in the professional fields of education and psychology. Limited selections are available in the natural sciences.

Among some of the special offerings for the summer are General History, Organic Chemistry, a Radio Workshop, Montessori Education, Contemporary American Poetry, Modern Ireland, Calculus, Marriage and the Family, and Introduction to Theology.

Sessions run five weeks. Day classes meet daily, Monday through Friday, while evening classes are held two-three evenings a week. A student is usually limited to a maximum of six semester hours of course work during a single session.

Continuing Education students interested in beginning a degree program during the summer sessions should contact the College of Continuing Education, Xavier University.

Students who register for courses and who fail to appear, unless officially withdrawn in accordance with the catalogue regulations regarding withdrawals, will receive automatic FAILURE for their courses and will be charged the regular summer session fees. Withdrawals must be made in the office through which registration was made in writing.

*14 meals include breakfast, lunch and dinner Monday through Thursday, and breakfast and lunch on Friday. Meal charges are mandatory with room.

The University will serve meals on the weekend of June 17 only, if there is a sufficient demand. Interested individuals must contact the Director of Food Services on the first day of summer sessions for arrangements for weekend meals. Restaurants do serve the nearby University community.

NOTE: The Director of Housing will assign single rooms on a space available basis. Since some limitation of this type of housing is expected, assignments will be made on a "first come, first served" plan.

FOOD SERVICE: OFF-CAMPUS STUDENTS

Meal service is also available for students living off-campus either on an *a la carte* basis or through arrangement with Director, Food Services Department, at a rate to cover a group of meals during part or all of a week.
