## SOUVENIRS CHOSEN FOR JUNE 2ND HOME-COMING

### Shrine Plaques To Be Presented

Guests at the Home-coming on Sunday, June 2, will be presented with souvenir plaques showing Xavier's outdoor shrine, dedicated to Our Lady, Queen of Victory and Peace, officials of the Alumni Association said this week.

Concerning hotel accommodations, Gen. P. Lincoln Mitchell, general chairman of the Home-coming committee, said that managers of the local establishments have assured him that they would be prepared to furnish ample accommodations for Xavier's out-of-town guests.

An information center has been established in Room 44 of Albers Hall. This office will function until 12 noon, June 1, when it will be shifted to the Student Union Building.

## ENROLLMENTS TO RISE AT XU

### X Allotted Housing Units; Prof. Shortage Big Problem

Student body at Xavier will more than double by next October, Raymond Fellingner, Xavier Registrar told the NEWS this week.

Applications for admission have been coming in at the rate of nearly twenty a day, Mr. Fellingner said. Plans have been made to accept 1,400 students for the fall session at the request of the state council handling veterans' education, he mentioned.

Simultaneously, Liberal Arts College Dean Victor B. Nieporte, S. J., announced plans for a double shift schedule to run from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. The biggest problem is securing faculty members to handle the big jump in enrollments, but some faculty members are being added to the staff, Fr. Neiporte said.


Director of Student Housing Fr. F. J. Fisher also announced the allotment of 174 housing units for the Xavier campus from the Public Housing Authority. Ten units will be occupied by married veteran faculty members, and 164 by veteran students.

## XU ROTC Unit To Be Inspected Soon

Annual inspection of Xavier's ROTC by a group of five officers from the Army's Fifth Service Command will be held this Monday morning on the parade grounds, an announcement from the Military Department said.

Activities will begin at 8:30 a. m., and will continue throughout the morning when all cadets from the corps will assemble, be questioned and reviewed by the Army officers. Cadets will take a series of tests consisting of squad and platoon drill, questions on weapons, military courtesy, field sanitation, map reading, first aid, articles of war, rifle marksmanship and other related subjects on army organization.

## ● We Have A Responsibility —

**T**ONIGHT the first reports on the \$400,000 Xavier Fund drive will be made. The importance of this drive to the students is self-evident. The ability of Xavier to maintain her high standards of service through the years to come is based largely on the funds which are now being collected. With a constantly expanding student body, every physical resource of the school is being taxed to the limit. Next year the strain will be even greater. The \$400,000 will enable Xavier to meet that strain with direct benefits to the individual students.

No direct appeal is being made to the students. However, there is a responsibility which we must bear. Possible donors look at us to judge Xavier — "by their fruits ye shall know them". We are Xavier in the eyes of the public. Let us then conduct ourselves in everything we do as the representatives of a great school. In this way we can help.

## ● What Is The Student Council?

**I**N THE PAST few weeks much criticism has been tossed about the campus concerning the way things are done at Xavier. The principal target seems to be the Student Council. It is accused of being everything from a clique of mutton-heads to an unorganized group of student reactionaries. We believe that the cause of most of this criticism is ignorance of what the Council is, what its job is and what means it has to fulfill its job.

It is impossible, for reasons of space, to give a really complete explanation of these things. Briefly, though, here are the facts: 1. The Student Council is an elected group which represents the entire student body. 2. The job of the Council is to act as liaison group between students and faculty. It coordinates and directs extra-curricular activities. For instance, it sponsors and directs intramurals, dances and other social events. 3. The Council has a fund with which it underwrites those affairs which are profitable and it is used for the benefit of the student body. There are many expenses, for example the maintenance of the jukebox in the Union and the buying of new records, for which the Student Council is supposed to pay. (Because the Council has had no funds, a collection has had to be taken up among the cafeteria patrons).

The present Council was elected last semester. There will be no elections this semester, but the Council, when elected, was representative of the student body and is composed of active men who spare no effort in fulfilling their job. These men have been overworked for sometime. They, like everyone else, are trying to graduate and have a lot to do. They don't mind fair criticism, but so far they have received little credit while they have received plenty of abuse. They would like a little credit, but more than that they'd like a little help. There is plenty of opportunity for more hands to help; just see Fr. Dietz or Fr. Englum and they will show you how you can do some good for YOUR school.


Last Saturday night the Council weighed in with an affair which was, frankly, a test of student interest in school social life. The results were encouraging. A nice crowd attended and had, judging by comment, a good time. The crowd might have been larger, but considering that this event was a beginning, it was heartening. Some fellows were disappointed in the fact that there were few unattached girls present. The Council has promised that this condition will be corrected at the dances which it has planned for the future.

The Get-to-Gether made a profit which went in the Council fund and which almost did away with the Council debt. When this debt is done away with and a surplus attained there will be more and better entertainment offered for students. It may be of interest to many to know that any losses on dances, etc., are covered by the Council fund, not by the school. Thus the reason why bigger and better entertainment is contingent on the Council being able to raise money of its own.

## MSGR. SHEEN GIVES OPINIONS IN INTERVIEW

Ever so often we are privileged to meet a great man and so we were not surprised when we met Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen. He is a person of great magnetic personality, a great showman, and a great orator. Usually when interviewing such men we feel very ill at ease but Monsignor Sheen has that quality puts one fully at ease. With the grace of an actor he ushered himself into the little room back stage in which we were waiting for him with the remark, "Age

is not a matter of years but a climate of the soul."

Specifically we had several questions which we wished to ask the monsignor, questions which seemed to fit into the "World Today." We asked him, "To what do you attribute the present wave of conversions to the Catholic faith among people of high public places, people like Clare Booth Luce? Is there any external reason?"

### Most Intelligent

The answer was that it was always the same explanation, cooperation of the will with actual grace. Reasons always differ with different people. Concerning the conversion of Mrs. Luce, Monsignor Sheen said that she was the most intelligent person, man or woman, that he had ever instructed. He went on to say that there really was no great wave of conversions but that it seemed that we were losing more than we are making, and that judging from the number of letters which he received nightly he wondered, . . . "if there is a happy marriage left in the world."

We asked Monsignor Sheen if, with the present wave of strikes which are so seriously hampering American industry, would legislation by Congress to curb the use of the strike privilege be construed as a violation of constitutional rights or social justice?

### Corporation of Unions

The monsignor's answer was that there are three things to be considered the employer, employee, and the common good. Congress therefore would violate social justice if it passed legislation to curb the strikes since the employee has his rights as well as the employer. "Eventually," said Sheen, "it will come to corporation of unions and unions will be subject to corporate law." He cited the Portuguese situation in which the employer and employee is in one union for the promotion of the common good.

We asked how a country as Catholic as Poland supposedly is can become so much under the domination of Russia, especially when you consider how

### SUMMER CLASS SETUP EXPLAINED — CINCY GETS VET REGIONAL OFFICE

Once again . . . for the benefit of the dozens who seem to be having difficulty in understanding how classes will function this summer so they can continue to receive full subsistence . . . we'll try to explain.

The standard unit of academic measurement is the credit. Semesters are planned on the basis of one credit for each week of college work.

When a veteran earns approximately sixteen credits in sixteen weeks (a semester), or six credits in six weeks (one summer term), or ten credits in ten weeks (two summer terms), he is doing full time work and will receive full subsistence.

Isn't that clear and definite

We would have liked to ask the monsignor many more questions but unfortunately it was time for his lecture. As a parting bit of advice Monsignor Sheen advised us that, "As a general rule, never believe anything you hear or read from a columnist." Great heavens! Where does that leave us?

Incidentally, because we've been asked about it so often, we'll also try to explain how the summer session has been arranged.

During the first summer term of six weeks, three-credit classes will meet daily for seventy-five minute periods (time and a half). Most veterans should take two such courses.

In some cases however, veterans may take one three-credit course and two two-credit courses.

Classes are scheduled to begin at 8:30, 10, and 11:30, whether they carry two or three credits. No class except labs will be in session after 12:45.

Since Tuesday there has been a sub-regional office of the Veterans Administration operating in Cincinnati. Files of all vets in school in this area should now be located in that office. This arrangement should facilitate the handling of all cases . . . we hope.

## Football Giants Have Fallen Before Xavier

### FAMILIAR FACES REMIND XAVIER OF PAST VICTORIES

As the 1946 edition of the Musketeers rumbles up and down the practice field, memories of other Xavier football teams swell up in the minds of those who are familiar with the athletic traditions of the school. The familiar faces of Arata, Marino, Janning, Donadio, Enase and Vikertovsky arouse remembrances of that afternoon in 1941, when under a bright sun the mighty Hoyas of Georgetown displayed their wares. The great Al Blozis, 6 ft. 6 inches and 250 pounds of All-American tackle; the gigantic Sorce, at 270 pounds, one of the biggest men ever to play college football; Bulvin at one half and Dooley, a 9:7 sprinter, at the other; all these were too much for the spirits of Xavier supporters. The local sportswriters predicted a walkaway for the Hoyas; Eastern sportswriters weren't even aware that Georgetown had a game scheduled with little 'Xavier of Cincinnati' (You have to say "of Cincinnati" so people will know what Xavier you're mentioning). But the eastern sportswriters heard of Xavier that night, for Chetty Mutryn, Bob Himmler and gang, including Arata and the others mentioned above, pulled one of the biggest "upsets" of the day, and for that matter, of the season. Or was it an upset? Those who really know an upset? And those who really know Xavier and the spirit it typifies will tell you that you can't call a Muskie victory over odds an "upset."

#### Spirit Game

This score in X-UC Game reminds one, too, of another afternoon — this one a soggy, gloomy Saturday afternoon in 1942. Fifteen thousand fans braved the inclement weather to watch the game Cincinnatians had waited

years to see, Xavier against U. C. in Nippert stadium. They saw as gallant, hard-fighting a band of Musketeers as ever played go down to a 9 to 0 defeat at the hands of a big, hard-driving Bearcat team, one of the greatest to ever wear the Red and Black. They saw Arata, Marino and all the rest give everything they had physically and then, when that was gone, fight on with only the great competitive spirit of Xavier. No one who was there, be he Bearcat or U. C. fan, will ever forget little Chet Mutryn punting the heavy ball again and again into U. C. territory, preventing with his magic toe a higher Bearcat score. This game was a defeat in terms of score, but never once did it threaten to be a taint on the spirit of Xavier.

#### Hoosiers Fall To Xavier

Coach Bucklew, himself, was in school when Xavier gave the experts another of those big surprises. This time (it was 1933) Indiana, Indiana of the Big Ten, came to Corcoran field to play the Muskies. Before the game and during the half, Indiana's two hundred piece band gave a demonstration of what several thousand students can do for a university. By comparison our little thirty piece band drew only a sympathetic chuckle from the stands. The chuckles became a roar when Leo Sack, 145 pounds of quarterback, punched his way five yards for a touchdown. The roar subsided as the crowd sat in stunned silence, realizing as the final seconds ticked off that Xavier had beaten the Hoosiers. A surprise? Yes, to the folks who look only for physical size, speed and ability to decide the winner of a game. No, to the people who take spirit into account.

Cincinnati football fans were very pleased over the recent announcement that several Cincinnati boys had been chosen to participate in the High School All-Star game at Toledo later this year. Two of the youths chosen played on teams in the Catholic High School League, in which Xavier as a Catholic institution has a special interest. In recent years the Catholic League has produced many outstanding players who have gone on to college and made names for themselves.
